

Auburn High School Students Produce Award-winning Artwork

Auburn High School students earned an astounding 31 awards in the 2019 CNY Scholastic Art & Writing Awards Regional Competition including eight gold keys, eight silver keys, and 15 honorable mentions.

Over 100 area schools across the 13-county Central New York region submitted 5,673 pieces of artwork. Roughly 50 judges comprised of professional artists, educators, and photographers awarded 1,589 works in 17 categories. Central New York award recipients were announced at an awards ceremony at Onondaga Community College in January, and all gold key pieces moved on to the national competition.

Auburn High School senior, **Gabrielle Wagner**, received national recognition for her Digital Art piece titled "Reaching Vines," which earned a silver medal in the 2019 Scholastic Art & Writing Awards national competition. Gabrielle's piece will be recognized in part at the national ceremony held at Carnegie Hall in New York City in June.

Gold Key Recipients for Digital Art: Elizabeth Diego "Shattered Image," Isaiah Lovell-Rose "Hot Head," Jamie Tallman "Makenna," and Gabrielle Wagner "Waterfall of Tears."

Gold Key Recipients for Sculpture: Anabel Kerstetter "Locked Mind" and Justeen Tanner "Notorious Bryce".

Gold Key Recipient for Drawing & Illustration: Gabrielle Wagner "Not Too Shabby."

AUBURN ATHLETICS ... Winter 2018-19 Team Summary

Girls Basketball: The team finished the season with a league record of 10-2, and an overall record of 15-5, to finish second place in the SCAC Empire Division and qualify for Sectionals. The team received a bye in the first round of tournament play before traveling to and defeating Indian River. The team lost in the semi-finals of the Section III Championship Tournament game at OCC versus Bishop Ludden. Second team SCAC All-League honors were earned by Grace Baranick and Iania Freeman. Stefanie Gera earned First team SCAC All-League honors, was named as a member of the Section III All-Star Tournament Team, was selected to All CNY large-school girls basketball team for the 2018-19 season, and joined the Auburn 1000 point club on January 3rd. In February the Auburn Girls Basketball team was honored as the SCAC Empire Division team of the month.

Boys Basketball: The team finished the season with a league record of 9-5, and an overall record of 11-11, to earn 3rd place in the SCAC

Empire Division and qualify for the Section III tournament. The team defeated Fulton at home in the first round of the tournament, but then lost at Whitesboro. Kaleb Cook reached 1626 points during the season to become the leading scorer in Auburn's boys basketball history. Shaheed Beal earned 2nd team SCAC All league honors. Kaleb Cook earned 1st Team SCAC honors, was named the SCAC Empire All League Boys Basketball Player of the Year, earned 1st team All CNY boys basketball recognition, and was named The Citizen's Winter 2019 Boys Basketball Player of the Year.



Ice Hockey: Auburn finished the season with an overall record of 9-13 and a league record of 4-8. The team finished in 6th place in regular season league play and qualified for the Section III Tournament as a 6th seed. Auburn traveled to Oswego in the first round

of Sectionals and defeated Oswego (3rd seed) 5-4, before falling in the tournament semi-finals to eventual NYS Champions Skaneateles 4-3. All league first team honors went to Johnny Malandruccolo, and Malandruccolo was also selected as the NYS Player of the Year by the NYS High School Hockey Coaches Association. All league honorable mention honors went to Ross Burgmaster, RJ Szakalski and Ty Hylwa. Citizen all stars were Johnny Malandruccolo, Ty Hylwa and Austin Black. Johny Malandruccolo was also NYS First Team All Star and the Post Standard ALL CNY. The team also qualified to earn the NYSPHSAA Scholar Athlete Award.



Boys Swimming: The Auburn Boys Varsity Swim team finished 10th overall in Sectionals. Team captains were Sam Carbonaro and Joshua Whiting.

Indoor Track: The SCAC Indoor Track league championship was canceled due to weather this year. That left both teams with a focus on the Section III Class A Championship meet

held February 7 at OCC. For the boys Jimmy Vasile finished 2nd (10:44.20) in the 3200 Meters; the 4 x 400 Relay team, consisting of Isaiah Lovell-Rose, Griffin Schoenfelder, Brian Rhodes, and Billy Liccion, placed 3rd (3:52.00); and six team members brought home 5th place finishes. For the girls at the Class A Championship Abbey Hai placed 2nd (29'4.75") in the shot put, Shelby Weeks placed 3rd (8 feet) in the pole vault, Gabi Wagner placed 4th (4'8") in the high jump, and there were four 5th place finishers, and nine 6th place finishers. Abby Hai qualified to attend the Section III State Qualifier Tournament held at OCC on February 13.



<u>Girls/Boys Bowling</u>: The girls team finished 8-2 in league and 12-4 overall, earning 1st place in the SCAC Empire Division, and finishing 6th overall in the Section III Tournament. The boys team finished 4-6 in

league and 5-11 overall, and placed 10th overall in the Section III Tournament. SCAC All-League 1st team honors were awarded to Benjamin Morabito. Kaylee Hodson, and Amber Pidlypchak, and Lily Snyder earned SCAC All-League 2nd team honors. Morabito, Hodson, Pidlypchak, Snyder and James Wilkes qualified to attend the State Qualifying tournament on February 14.



<u>Wrestling:</u> The team finished with a 3-3 league record, and an overall record of 4-8, to earn 4th place in the SCAC Empire Division. Individually, 11 wrestlers qualified for the Class AA Tournament, and

Auburn boasted 5 finalists and 2 class champions (Luca Pirozzolo and Lucas Hogan). Individually, 8 wrestlers qualified for Sectionals and 3 placed in the top 6: Luca Pirozzolo (Sectional Champ), Keyshin Cooper (3rd place), and Lucas Hogan (5th place). Luca Pirozzolo (132 lbs) qualified for the State Tournament, received the Section III Sportsmanship Award at the State Tournament, and earned his 100th career victory during the season. Pirozzolo, as a sophomore, is the first wrestler in 42 years to win a Section III Championship and advance to the NYSPHSAA Wrestling State Championship Tournament to represent Auburn and Section III. Academically, 11 wrestlers earned an overall average of 90 or above.



Auburn Junior High School Musical

Auburn Junior High School is presenting the musical *Annie Get Your Gun* on April 5, 6 & 7, 2019, in Emerson Auditorium. The plot of *Annie Get Your Gun* concerns the fabulous career of sharpshooter Annie Oakley (Charli Tallman) and her love for Frank Butler (Henry Moskov), whom she ousts as the star of Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show. In a contest with Butler, Annie beats him and at the same time falls hopelessly in love with him. In order to be near him she accepts a job as his assistant in the Wild West Show replacing his assistant, Dolly Tate (Emerson Brown), and her skills are such that after a while Frank decides to make her his partner.

Meanwhile, Buffalo Bill (Dustin Swartwood) has discovered that his show is going broke because of competition from Pawnee Bill's (Stephen Casto) outfit. Buffalo Bill and his manager, Charlie Davenport (Nick Rivoli), persuade Annie to do a sensational act, which overshadows that of her partner and beloved. Frank leaves the show in a fury and joins Pawnee Bill as his star attraction.

Annie is brokenhearted but Sitting Bull (Logan Mosley), the famous Sioux Warrior, tries to console her by adopting her as his daughter and putting up the money to enable the show to continue. The European tour that follows results in a personal triumph for Annie, who returns to the United States with many valuable medals. The show, however, is in financial trouble and Pawnee Bill invites Buffalo Bill's troupe to a reception welcoming them home. Bill's show is playing Madison Square Garden with apparent success, but actually he owes money and he too is anxious to combine the two shows.

When Annie and Frank meet again they declare their love for each other and Frank presents Annie with his medals inscribed to "the champion sharpshooter of the world!" Annie cannot accept his superiority and challenges him to a shooting match to decide the title, betting her medals against his. Sitting Bull and Charlie are determined that she shall lose the match – and thus win Frank. They twist the sights on her guns and she misses each shot. Eventually she understands their scheme and, playing for Frank's sympathy, concedes the match to "Frank Butler! The greatest sharpshooter in the world!" Delighted, Frank is more than willing to offer to take care of Annie, make her his partner again, combine the shows, and start them off by selling the medals. Annie is supremely happy, having finally learned how to get a man with a gun!

The show is filled with a treasure trove of Irving Berlin's hits, including "Doin' What Comes Natur'lly," "You Can't Get A Man With A Gun," "Anything You Can Do," and the show business anthem "There's No Business Like Show Business."

Seward Students Producing Podcasts

During this three-month cycle of ELT (Extended Learning Time), Mr. Keysor's class has been working on

preparing submissions for the National Public Radio (NPR) Student Podcast Challenge. Using materials provided by NPR and supported by software such as the Google Suite of products (Google Classroom, Drive, Docs, Sheets, etc.) and the free-to-download sound editing application Audacity, students have been guided through the process of preparing and recording their own podcasts. The students began by first learning about podcasts and listening to examples of them recommended by NPR. Then, the students generated a list of over 100 ideas and narrowed down their preferences to just two driving questions: "Why do we have the school lunches that we have?" and "What was the Great Emu War of Australia?" The students took on jobs such as being producers, sound editors, writers, and interviewers, working as a team to produce the show they were envisioning. As time allowed, a third group was formed once the original two teams moved into postproduction, which focuses on the health benefits of students participating in sports. The contest ended March 31st, 2019. The winning podcast teams will be visited and interviewed by NPR and a portion of their show may be aired during an episode of NPR's "Morning Edition". The students have worked very hard and learning the skills to produce a podcast has opened up the possibility for them to continue recording shows long after this ELT cycle ends. In fact, Mr. Keysor and his colleague Mr. Stowell are leading an after-school club for fifth and sixth graders who would like to create podcasts independently of the NPR Student Podcast Challenge. These students plan to produce three podcasts: "How the 'Pete the Cat' book series reads differently to younger kids versus to older kids," "Why students should read the 'Land of Stories' book series," and a narrative about a student learning an actual lesson from a teacher with soothing sounds added in for effect. The book related podcasts may be added to our librarian's, Mrs. Cuddy's, website so that students can listen to them and be inspired to read those books.



Seward Students "Dissect" Their Learning

The Fourth Grade at Seward Elementary transformed their classrooms into 3 operating rooms. It was rigorous, handson, play-based and had the 4th grade doctors begging for more! Each student performed three different "surgeries". Part of creating a learning experience means going all-in, so the teachers decided to have everyone "scrub" in for a fun filled day! In operating room one students worked on composing and decomposing equivalent fractions. In operating room two, students dissected vocabulary of a flower and explored the flower part functions and then creatively assembled their own model. Lastly, in operating room 3, they were asked to explore a text, "the patients' history" and discover the problem as well as develop a "treatment plan" (the solution). Students then crafted a paragraph reporting their findings. Throughout these three "surgeries" students were not only working on meeting grade level standards, but also utilizing 21st century skills.


