Auburn H.S. Science Teacher Helps University of Rochester's iGEM Team Develop Synthetic Biology Curriculum for High School Students

When our team members reflected back on our own high school education, we found ourselves wishing that we had learned more about synthetic biology. We've made it our goal to expand the science resources available to high school science teachers in order to inspire the next generation of scientists and synthetic biologists. But we knew that we couldn't do it alone and that we would need the help of passionate science teachers from nearby schools.



University of Rochester Noyce Master Teaching Fellow and Auburn H.S. AP Biology teacher Mr. Crawford graciously offered to meet with our team to discuss ways to teach high school students about synthetic biology, a rapidly growing field in biological and medical research. During our Zoom call on June 8th, Mr. Crawford expressed how learning about synthetic biology in AP biology and living environment can get students excited about the biological applications of what they are learning in the classroom. He also gave the team ideas about how to create material that is easy for high school teachers to integrate into their biology curriculum. Our team appreciates Mr. Crawford sharing his expertise with us. We look forward to working with Mr. Crawford this summer as he will be giving the team valuable feedback on the synthetic biology materials that we create!

The University of Rochester iGEM (international Genetic Engineered Machines) Competition team is a group of 12 undergraduates who solve real world problems using synthetic biology. Synthetic biology is a field of science which redesigns and engineers existing biological parts (i.e. DNA sequences, enzymes, gene pathways, and much more) to give new functions to an organism which, overall, would benefit society in one way or another.

This program will run Monday through Friday throughout the summer with it ending on Friday, August 28, 2020.

When: Every Wednesday starting at 9:15AM (expected to continue throughout the summer)

The Auburn Enlarged City School District thanks and appreciates the Food Bank of Central NY, the Auburn Police Department, and the countless volunteers who have allowed the district to provide these food boxes for district families.

Food Bank of CNY

Through a grant funded by the Food Bank of Central NY, the school district was able to have 120 cases of food delivered to Genesee Elementary School. Nine educators volunteered to put together a total of 359 bags of food for district families.

Casey Park Clubs

LEGO Robotics:

Our robotics team consisted of six students in fifth and sixth grade. Some of our team members attend summer STEAM Camp at our local BOCES. They use the skills that they learn at the camp to bring back to our team for competition. This year's theme was eco-friendly cities. Students first built a small city of Legos to use to complete their challenge. Once their city was built they then built and coded a robot to complete assigned missions. They were able to build attachments for their robots to ensure that it was able to complete tasks. Along with the Lego building and Robot, students had to complete a long-term problem. This year they decided to focus on solar powered crosswalks throughout the City of Auburn. They thought that each school should have a solar powered crosswalk that would blink lights to alert drivers that students would be crossing. The lights would be solar powered to keep them eco-friendly.

STEM Club:

Our STEM club typically consists of fourth and fifth grade students. The students complete a long-term problem that solves an issue somewhere in the world. Last year students created a clean water system for various countries. They were able to purchase supplies based on their country's income and location in the world. They then created a filtration system for their country that we tested. The club also completes weekly tasks using Robots, Legos, Brainflakes, 3D printer pen, and much more. The kids had to use their critical thinking, creativity, and teamwork skills to complete challenging tasks that they were given.



Technology Club:

Casey Park Technology Club consisted of 2 students in each class from 4th grade thru 6th grade. These students were trained as Technology Jedi's to be the Technology Mentors in each classroom. They were training with mastery on how to use basic functions on the Promethean Boards in the class and how to help Teachers and students use the Promethean Board and Chrome books.



Odyssey of the Mind:

The Casey Park Odyssey of the Mind Team (OM) consisted of six students from 3rd grade. They all collaborated on a long-term project that they picked. This year's problem was an OM Classic called **The Effective Detective**. This amazing group of kids picked to solve the mystery behind the **Mary Celeste Ghost Ship**. The detective needed to investigate different types of information pertaining to the mystery behind the **Mary Celeste** crew disappearance while incorporating a "red herring" clue to distract the detective. This creative skit had to include several other pieces like an intellectual battle with the supervillain while solving the ship's mystery.

The kids worked hard on their solution to the problem but were not able to compete at Regionals this year due to COVID 19 school closures. They are excited to return next year and showcase their accomplishments in the years to come.

Young Entrepreneur Heads to National Competition

Genesee Elementary School sixth grade student Johntae Smith was the youngest participant in the year-long Young Entrepreneur Academy (YEA) held for the first time in Auburn at Cayuga Community College. Smith and his business partner, Alexander Church, an eight grade student at Union Springs Middle School, launched a business called EZ-Carries. Their main product is a 3D printed water bottle holder that clips to crutches, canes, walkers and wheelchairs. The boys pitched their business idea virtually to an investor panel and were awarded the top grant of \$1,000 to put toward their business. They will be heading to the YEA Saunders National Conference and Competition at the end of August, where they will compete for \$50,000 in college scholarships.

Started in 2004, the YEA! (yeausa.org) program takes students ages 11-18 through the process of starting and launching a real business or social movement over the course of an academic year. By the end of the class, students own and operate fully-formed and functioning businesses, which may be carried on after their graduation from the program. Former Senator Michael Nozzolio, through his organization, Locate Finger Lakes, sponsored this year’s class.

Five other Auburn students also completed the YEA! Program this year. Madison Chambers, a junior at Auburn High School, developed a non-profit organization called Sports 4 All (www.sports-for-all.org) that will offer free cleats, sports equipment and scholarships to those in need. Madison placed third in the competition and was awarded \$250 by the investors.

Other Auburn students who completed the program and started their own business include Clara Neuman, an eighth grader at AJHS, Becca Brewer, a ninth grade student at Auburn High School, Kayden Parry and Helena Evans-Murphy, both seniors at Auburn High School.

“We’ll Make a Way Out of No Way”

For the past six years, Genesee fourth grade students have participated in a research and song-writing project with musicians Greg Artzner and Terry Leonino, who go by the name, Magpie.



This project focuses on Harriet Tubman’s life in Auburn. During the first two weeks of June, over twenty Genesee fourth grade students and six teachers participated virtually in this research and song-writing project. Prior to the start of the project, fourth grade teachers Beth Robinson, Alison Donofrio and Mike Falzarano delivered a packet to each student’s home. The packet included a timeline of Tubman’s life, lyrics to the songs created by 4th graders from the past six years and primary source documents. Each student also received a small apple pie, which they ate together at the first meeting while Mrs. Mlod, librarian at Genesee, read the book “An Apple for Harriet Tubman.”

Music teachers Justina Taylor and Erin Woodworth also participated in the project. Part of the research included zooms with Kimberly Szewczyk, Park Ranger for the Tubman National Historical Park, as well as noted author and Tubman scholar Kate Clifford Larson.

Two zoom sessions were held each day of the second week, during which students brainstormed lyrics for the song. The title they chose is “We’ll Make a Way Out of No Way”. It means doing something that others don’t think you can do. It is a phrase that has been used by African Americans for a long time.

After finishing the lyrics, Magpie created a melody to accompany the lyrics. Normally the students would be recorded as a group; this year each student met with one of the six teachers in a zoom meeting and was recorded singing the lyrics while listening to music on headphones.

The students decided to dedicate the song to George Perry Floyd and all of the frontline healthcare workers.

A zoom celebration was held on June 19th (Juneteenth) at which time the students and teachers were able to hear the final product, which required an audio engineer to combine each individual student’s performance with that of the musicians.

The students’ dedication and perseverance, as well as the support of Martha Swan of the organization, John Brown Lives! and the Harriet Tubman Boosters made this project a success.

BMI Notification for 2020 – 2021 School Year

As part of a required school health examination, a student is weighed and his/her height is measured. These numbers are used to figure out the student's body mass index, or "BMI." The BMI helps the doctor or nurse know if the student's weight is in a healthy range or is too high or too low. Recent changes to the New York State Education Law require that BMI and weight status group be included as part of the student's school health examination. A sample of school districts will be selected to be part of the survey; we will be reporting to New York State Department of Health information about our students' weight status groups. Only summary information is sent. No names and no information about individual students are sent. However, you may choose to have your child's information excluded from this survey report.

The information sent to the New York State Department of Health will help health officials develop programs that make it easier for children to be healthier.

PESTICIDE NOTIFICATION

Dear Parents, Guardians, and School Staff:

New York State Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

The Auburn Enlarged City School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- a school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application;
- anti-microbial products;
- nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- nonvolatile insecticidal baits in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- the application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- the application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25;
- the use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps, and hornets.

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA)

Students who are applying to colleges, please be aware that procedures for the confidentiality of student records within the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) have recently changed. FERPA permits school officials to disclose all education records, including disciplinary records, to another institution at which the student seeks or intends to enroll. This now also applies to post-secondary institutions (colleges), upon request.

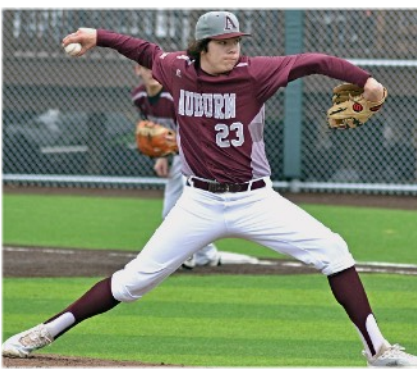
