Auburn High School Teacher Named Master Teacher

New York State has named 214 master teachers to the New York State Master Teachers Program (NYSMTP), and **Auburn High School science teacher, Patrick Crawford**, is one of them.

The NYSMTP began in 2013 and has named 908 master teachers since its inception. New York State Master Teachers are innovators and leaders in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) education.

Crawford, who teaches AP Biology and Biomedical Science, joins three other Auburn High School science teachers – Kathleen Austin, Judith Coye, and Janet Scheffler – currently in the program.

As part of the program, master teachers receive \$15,000 stipends each year over four years to use toward professional development and peer mentoring. They must participate in a minimum of 50 professional development hours each year.



"It is obviously an honor to be selected as a master teacher," Crawford said.

"I am looking forward to taking advantage of professional development opportunities that I have not been able to in the past, as well as the chance to collaborate with other teachers and learn from one another, all while promoting the STEM field."

Congratulations, Mr. Crawford!




Literary Pumpkins

Where in the World is Ms. Donaldson's Class?



That's what students in Mrs. Terry's kindergarten class at Genesee Elementary School were trying to find out when they participated in a "Mystery Skype" with Ms. Donaldson's kindergarten class. Mystery Skype is a global guessing game in which a class is partnered with another class but doesn't know the location of their partner class. Students have to use their critical thinking skills to develop questions that can only be answered with a "Yes" or "No" to narrow down the location of the other school. Mrs. Terry's students asked questions including "Is your state bordered by an ocean?" and "Does your state border Canada?" With help from their 6th grade helpers, Mrs. Terry's students had to figure out the answers to the questions posed by Ms. Donaldson's students (one of the easier ones was "Does the name of your state have two words?"). Eventually, both classes were able to guess the other's location; Mrs. Terry's students were excited to discover that Ms. Donaldson's class is located in Alabama...Auburn, Alabama! The two classes are now writing letters and sending packages to each other, and will skype again in the future to learn more about each other.

UPK offerings in the Auburn School District

Universal Pre-Kindergarten programs provide opportunities for all three and four year olds to be enrolled in an exciting preschool program. These programs enable parents, childcare providers, preschool special education programs, nursery schools, community-based organizations, and other early childhood programs to work in collaboration with the Auburn Enlarged City School District to develop and implement high quality educational programs for resident three and four year olds.

Research indicates that quality pre-kindergarten experiences promote academic success and greater achievement in school, which is why the 3PK and UPK programs are integral components of the Auburn school district. Any Auburn resident who is three or four years of age on or before December 1 of the current school year is eligible to apply, and since the programs are state-funded, there is no cost for eligible children to attend.

Michelle Kolceski will be joining the district as the Director of Early Learning at the end of October. She is a tenured administrator and teacher with New York State certifications for Nursery – Grade 12 and a solid understanding of teaching and learning in literacy and mathematics. She has extensive instructional and supervisory experience at the Kindergarten foundational level, helping teachers implement rigorous educational standards, evaluate effectiveness of their instructional programs, and meet students where they are. In her previous position, much of her focus was spent on identifying learning gaps and providing early intervention, allowing for the strongest start for all students.

"I believe we must partner with families to foster a love of learning that builds upon a child's natural curiosity," Kolceski says.

"I look forward to working in the Auburn Enlarged City School District and am excited about the opportunities provided to students and families from 3PK and up!"

Amy Bryan is a UPK/Primary Instructional Coach, providing instructional, curricular, and assessment support to teachers in the five elementary school buildings in Auburn, as well as to the UPK and 3PK preschool teachers in the district's community preschool classrooms.

"I love getting to interact with young children on a daily basis and knowing that the support I can provide through the school district can assist a teacher in helping many more children than I would be able to help on my own in a single classroom," Bryan states.

Maribeth Delany is the special education teacher, Behavioral Specialist, and CPSE Chairperson for the 3PK, UPK, and Kindergarten programs. It is her responsibility as an educator and chairperson to ensure students are placed in the best educational settings with the best supportive services, especially for the special education students. This includes not only classroom services like special education, speech, OT, and PT, but also meeting regularly with teachers and parents and making sure that there is adequate communication between all parties involved in the students' education.

"What I enjoy most about what I do is interacting with students in the classroom," Delany says.

"It thrills me to see their love for learning, as well as their kindness and empathy for others, and I believe an inclusive preschool program allows these character traits to develop in our youngest students."

The Auburn Enlarged City School District has been facing significant budget shortfalls year after year due to major flaws with the New York State Foundation Aid formula and its lack of funding.


SOAR into LEARNING

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Enhanced STAR Exemption for Senior Citizens

Senior property owners who already have a Basic STAR Exemption on their primary residence may be eligible for the Enhanced STAR Exemption when they are 65. You should apply when you are 64 so that, if you qualify, you may receive the exemption beginning the year that you turn 65. Auburn city residents should contact the Assessor's Office at City Hall on South Street (315-255-4125). Other Auburn (Aurelius, Throop, Owasco, Sennett, Fleming) and Cayuga County residents should contact their local assessor's office. The deadline for applications for Auburn city residents is February 1. Other Auburn and Cayuga County residents should check with their local assessor.

The Enhanced STAR program for senior citizens provides eligible seniors an exemption from school property taxes for owner-occupied, primary residences. To be eligible for this exemption, a property owner must be 65 years of age or older on December 31, 2017, with income not exceeding \$86,000.

STAR provides qualifying households with up to a \$65,500 exemption on the full value of their property. Qualifying residents owning a home with a full value of \$100,000 will recognize an estimated \$1,158 in Enhanced STAR tax savings in 2017-2018.
