Participating in ACE is an exploration and pathway toward your own college experience; you are not obligated to apply or attend any of the sponsoring schools.



- 1) Regular participation in ACE events and maintaining a level of academic success qualifies you for a college application recommendation letter
- 2) Recognized application status at the four sponsoring colleges
- 3) Tailored college visits once a year, sponsored by the four ACE Colleges (see program slides for more detail)
- 4) Access to college resources, skill development for academic and personal success, and support on your journey toward college
- 5) Ability to apply for financial support toward college application and supplies
- 6) Connect with other students and family members asking similar questions and experiencing some of the same transition concerns and excitements

Campus Visits: These field trips are designed for students, specific for each grade level, and occur during the school day. During the experience, students will hear from current college students, participate in educational workshops related to the college experience, go on a college tour, and eat in the campus dining hall.

Regional Institutes and Workshops: Open to students and their family members, these evening or weekend programs cover a variety of college-readiness topics. Presenters include faculty and staff from local colleges, high school counselors and teachers, and local community members.

Campus Connection Events: Students and their family members are invited to attend guest speakers, music, theater, and athletic events at ACE colleges and universities. These events are not planned by the ACE office; however, we strongly encourage these experiences as part of your college exploration.

Summer Programs: Students can participate in workshops designed to support academic success skills and college readiness. These events are hosted on the four sponsoring college campuses during the summer months.

*Students are also able to use their participation at external college events toward their ACE involvement expectation.



ACE access to college education

1) Do I have to attend one of the four sponsoring colleges to participate in ACE? No, you are not obligated to attend the sponsoring institutions; however, ACE is an excellent opportunity to start networking early on in your college search.



2) Is there a fee to participate in ACE? No, there is no fee for ACE participation. For some events, students and family members will need to provide their own transportation; however, ride sharing is part of the ACE tradition.

3) Can 8th graders participate in programming? Yes! During the summer, before your 9th grade year, ACE facilitates programs that all students are welcome to join.

4) What programs are offered for family members? Family members receive all ACE communication and are invited to follow us through social media. Specific programs are offered at Regional Institutes and Workshops, and you are invited to attend campus connection events with your student.

5) When can you join ACE? Students and family members can apply at the end of their 8th grade year or anytime during high school.

6) How do students travel to campus visits? This program counts as a field trip, and students travel via school bus or van.

7) Remind me how to apply for ACE? We encourage all students to discuss ACE with their high school counselor. Right now we are using an online registration form (link on slide 15). Students and at least one family member should fill the application out together.
