



Grievance Procedure for Non-Discrimination Policy

The compliance officer, upon request, will provide a copy of the district's grievance procedure to any employee, student or other covered person.

A copy of each of the Acts and Regulations upon which this notice is based will be made available, upon written request to the district compliance officer.

TITLE IX

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (Title IX) prohibits discrimination based on sex in education programs and activities that receive federal financial assistance. Title IX states "No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance[.]" All federal agencies that provide grants of financial assistance are required to enforce Title IX's nondiscrimination mandate. The U.S. Department of Education (Department) gives grants of financial assistance to schools and colleges and to certain other entities, including vocational rehabilitation programs and libraries.

In 1975, the Department's predecessor, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, issued final regulations implementing Title IX. Recently, the Department engaged in notice-and-comment to formally amend the Title IX regulations for the first time in over 40 years. After reviewing over 124,000 public comments, the Department issued final Title IX regulations on May 6, 2020. The new Title IX regulation, which is codified in the Code of Federal Regulations at 34 CFR Part 106, is enforced by the Department's Office for Civil Rights (OCR).

Examples of the types of discrimination that are covered under Title IX include sexual harassment; the failure to provide equal athletic opportunity; sex-based discrimination in a school's science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) courses and programs; and discrimination based on pregnancy. A fuller list of Title IX issues OCR addresses appears here.

Title IX also prohibits retaliation for filing an OCR complaint or for advocating for a right protected by Title IX and discrimination in employment which is based on sex. However, employment discrimination complaints filed with OCR are generally referred to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

Non-Discrimination Policy

The Auburn Enlarged City School District, in accordance with Title IX of the educational Amendments of 1972, Title VI of The Civil Rights Act of 1964, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Title II of the Americans With Disabilities Act, or the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, doe not discriminate on the basis of race, color, creed, religion, national origin, political affiliation, sex, age, marital or veteran status, or disability. The Board of Education recognizes its responsibility to provide an environment free from harassment and intimidation in the educational programs or activities it operates.

We do not permit discrimination by employees, school volunteers, students and non-employees such as contractors and vendors, as well as any third parties participating in, observing or otherwise engaged in activities subject to the supervision of the district. This includes recruitment and employment practices, pay and benefits, counseling services for students, access by students to education programs, courses and activities. The Board also prohibits harassment based upon an individual's opposition to the discrimination or participation in a related investigation or complaint proceeding under the anti-discrimination statutes.

This policy of non-discrimination and anti-harassment will be enforced on school district premises, in school buildings and all school sponsored events, programs and activities including those that take place off school premises. Board of Education

The Auburn School District is governed by a nine member Board of Education. Members each serve a three-year term with three members being elected each May.

The Board usually conducts meetings on the second Tuesday at 7:00PM and the fourth Tuesday at 6:00:PM of each month. The meetings are held at Auburn High School, Lake Avenue, unless preannounced for a different time or location. A time for the public to address the board is scheduled at each regular business meeting.

Responsibilities of the B.O.E.

- Establish, monitor, and evaluate goals and objectives of the schools
- Establish policies for the operation of the schools, subject to limitations by state law and regulations of the Commissioner of Education
- Select the Superintendent of Schools
- Appoint personnel upon the recommendation of the Superintendent of Schools
- Develop and present an annual budget for consideration by district residents
- Communicate the needs and progress of the schools to the community
- Exercise the community's rights to local control over public education



On Tuesday, May 16, 2023, the Board of Education will go to the qualified voters of the Auburn Enlarged City School District to seek approval for the 2023-2024 school budget. Preparation for the budget is a long process and the Board makes every effort to explore all possible sources of income to guide the expenditure of funds to achieve the greatest educational returns for our children. Complaint Response Procedure

Complaints by citizens regarding any facet of the District school operation often can be handled more satisfactorily by the administrative office in charge of the unit closest to the source of the complaint. In most instances, complaints will be made to the building Principal and/or his/her assistant, if the verbal complaint cannot be resolved by the teacher, coach, or other school building or district level employee.

If the verbal complaint is not resolved at the unit level the following steps will be taken:

The complaint will be submitted in writing to the District Clerk. The District Clerk will maintain a complaint log and will contact the sender within five days of the receipt.

Within 10 days of the receipt of the complaint by the District Clerk, the Superintendent of the District, or designee, will review the submitted complaint, and will contact the sender, outlining steps which will be taken regarding the particulars of the complaint.

The Superintendent will oversee a resolution of the issues cited in the complaint. If the resolution attempts are not successful, the Superintendent will present to the Board of Education a summary of the complaint and attempts to resolve the complaint.

The Board of Education will have the right to review all the information gathered by the District during the complaint process. The district leadership team, comprised of the Superintendent and the Board President and Vice President, will act accordingly to resolve the issues of the complaint in a reasonable period of time. The resolution will be recorded by the District Clerk and all involved parties will be copied in the resolution.

It shall be the responsibility of the Superintendent to prepare procedures, as may be needed within this policy, to channel the complaints so that they may be properly reviewed and acted upon.

Anonymous complaints of any type shall be disregarded. The complaint policy will be reviewed annually by the district.



Working Papers

For anyone under 18 years of age, working papers are required for all types of jobs including newspaper carriers. These may be obtained at Auburn High School (255-8309) for high school students, and at Auburn Junior High (255-8482) for junior high school students.

Home Tutoring

Policy 8450 describes procedures for students requiring home tutoring for the Auburn Enlarged City School District. When a parent/guardian anticipates a prolonged absence due to a physical, mental, or emotional illness, the parent/guardian can request tutoring for the child while absent from school. The parent/guardian should provide a prescription describing the diagnosis and the expected period of absence in support of the request for tutoring. Under State Education Law, a prolonged absence is one that lasts for two weeks or longer. However, with appropriate documentation and in consideration of uniquely compelling circumstances, the District will consider provision of home tutoring for absences of less than two weeks. The procedures include, but are not limited to the following:

- The Nursing Supervisor will request that a Release of Information with the student's physician be signed by the parent/guardian. Upon receipt of the prescription, the District has an obligation and right to make inquires of the physician as there must be a legitimate basis of medial necessity for alternative instruction (tutoring). Therefore, the nursing Supervisor will communicate with the physician in order to fully understand the extent of the student's condition. The District has the right to ask for additional information to substantiate the prescription request. A treatment plan may be requested along with periodic updates from the physician on the student's condition.
- The District also has a tutoring site where services are provided. If a received prescription states "home tutoring", the Nursing Supervisor will discuss with the physician if the student can appropriately receive instruction at the tutoring site.
- The Nursing Supervisor will make a determination regarding the tutoring, location, and duration, after consultation with the physician and parent/guardian. Any questions regarding tutoring will be directed to the Nursing Supervisor. In the event that there is not a legitimate basis for the tutoring, it may be denied after consultation with the School Physician.
- Elementary students receive five hours of tutoring a week and secondary students receive 10 hours of tutoring a week while classes are in session, excluding holidays and vacations.
- A Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 referral may be considered when tutoring is required for lengthy periods of time and deemed necessary to meet the student's educational needs.

Student Complaints and Grievances Procedures

A student alleging that there is an action affecting him/her which is prohibited by Title IX and/or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) (i.e., that discriminates upon the basis of sex/or disability) should read the following information regarding the resolution of the complaint or grievance.

Definitions

Grievant shall mean a student who alleges that there has been a violation of Title IX or Section 504 Regulations or the ADA which affect him/her.

Grievance shall mean any alleged violation of Title IX or of Section 504 Regulations or the ADA.

Compliance Officer shall mean the employee designated by the Board of Education to coordinate efforts to comply with and carry out responsibilities under Title IX and/or Section 504 and the ADA.

Representative shall mean any person designated by the grievant as his/her counsel or to act in his/her behalf.

Stage I — Compliance Officer

- 1. Within thirty (30) days after the events giving rise to the grievance, the grievant shall file a grievance in writing with the Compliance Officer. The Compliance Officer may informally discuss grievance with the grievant. He/She shall promptly investigate the complaint. All employees of the school district shall cooperate with the Compliance Officer in such investigations.
- 2. Within fifteen (15) days of the receipt of the grievance, the Compliance Officer shall make a finding in writing that there has or has not been a violation of Title IX or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act or the ADA. In the event the Compliance Officer finds that there has been a violation, he/she shall propose a resolution of the complaint.
- 3. If the grievant is not satisfied with the finding of the Compliance Officer, or with the proposed resolution of the grievance, the grievance may, within fifteen (15) days after he/she has received the report of the Compliance Officer, file a written request for review by the Superintendent.

Stage II — Superintendent of Schools

- 1. The Superintendent may request that the grievant, the Compliance Officer, or any member of the school district staff present a written statement to him/her setting forth any information that such person has relative to the grievance and the facts surrounding it.
- 2. The Superintendent shall notify all parties concerned as to the time and place when an informal hearing will be held where such parties may appear and present oral and written statements supplementing their position in the case. Such hearing shall be held within fifteen (15) school days of the receipt of the appeal by the Superintendent.
- 3. Within fifteen (15) days of the hearing, the Superintendent shall render his/her determination in writing. Such determination shall include a finding that there has or has not been a violation of Title IX and/or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act or the ADA, a proposal for equitably resolving the complaint.
- 4. If the grievant is not satisfied with the determination of the Superintendent, the grievant may, within fifteen (15) days after its receipt, file with the Clerk of the Board of Education, a written request for review by the Board.

Stage III — Board of Education

- 1. When a request for review by the Board has been made, the Superintendent shall submit all written statements and other materials concerning the case to the President of the Board.
- 2. The Board shall notify all parties concerned of the time and place when a hearing will be held. Such hearing will be held within fifteen (15) school days of the receipt of the request of the grievant. All parties concerned shall have the right to present further statements and testimony at such hearing.
- 3. The Board shall render a decision in writing within fifteen (15) days after the hearing has been concluded.

Code of Conduct on School Property

The Auburn Enlarged City School District has developed and will amend, as appropriate, a written Code of Conduct for the Maintenance of Order on School Property, including school functions, which shall govern the conduct of students, teachers, and other school personnel, as well as visitors. The Board of Education shall further provide for the enforcement of such Code of Conduct.

The Board of Education is committed to providing a safe and orderly school environment where students may receive and district personnel may deliver quality educational services without disruption or interference. Responsible behavior by students, teachers, other district personnel, parents and other visitors is essential to achieving this goal.

The District has a long-standing set of expectations for conduct on school property and at school functions. These expectations are based on the principles of civility, mutual respect, citizenship, character, tolerance, honesty, and integrity. Unless otherwise indicated, this code applies to ALL students, school personnel, parents and other visitors when on school property or attending a school function.

For the purposes of this policy, and the implemented Code of Conduct, school property means in or within any building, structure, athletic playing field, playground, parking lot land contained within the real property boundary line of the District's elementary or secondary schools, or in or on a school bus; and a school function shall mean a school-sponsored extra-curricular event or activity.

The District Code of Conduct has been developed in collaboration with students, teachers, administrators, and parent organizations, school safety personnel and other school personnel.

The Code of Conduct shall include, at a minimum, the following:

- 1) Student Rights and Responsibilities
- 2) Responsibilities of Staff and Parents
- 3) Student Dress Code
- 4) Prohibited Student Conduct
- 5) Reports to Law Enforcement
- 6) Disciplinary Penalties and Procedures
- 7) Disciplinary Responsibilities
- 8) Alternative Instruction
- 9) Corporal Punishment and Acts of Restraint
- 10) Discipline of Students with Disabilities
- 11) Public Conduct on School Property
- 12) Dissemination and Review

The District's Code of Conduct shall be reviewed on an annual basis, and updated as necessary in accordance with the law. The School Board shall re-approve any updated Code of Conduct or adopt revisions only after at least one public hearing that provides for the participation of school personnel, parents/persons in parental relation, students, and any other interested parties.

This adopted Code of Conduct has been implemented to comply with the new Safe Schools Legislation.

Copies of the Code of Conduct are available in all school building libraries and main offices.

Enrolling Homeless Children and Youth

Under the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act homeless children have the following rights:

Immediate Enrollment – The right to be enrolled immediately in school, without medical or academic records, regardless of district policy.

Choice of Schools – The homeless child has three choices:

School of Origin: Children and youth may continue to attend their school of origin – the school which the homeless child or youth attended when permanently housed or the school in which the child was last enrolled, if not so attending, the school in which the child or youth was entitled to attend or would have been entitled to attend upon reaching school age.


School of Current Location: Children and youth may transfer to the school that is zoned for the location of the temporarily housing site or in any school that non-homeless students who live in the attendance area are eligible to attend.

A School District participating in a regional placement plan.

Transportation – Homeless children are entitled to the same rights to transportation as other children in their district.

Services – Homeless children are entitled to the same services, such as tutoring, that are available to other children in their districts.




Student Records

The procedures for the confidentiality of student records shall be consistent with federal statutes, including the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) and its implementing regulations, and the Commissioner's Regulations.

A parent or legal quardian is entitled to inspect his/her student records files. Permanent record files generally include progress reports, subject grades, achievement scores, medical records, disciplinary records, guidance notes, and evaluation of student by educators. At the time of such inspection, appropriate school personnel are present to prevent misinterpretations of the record and to answer questions. Access to both permanent and temporary record files is limited to the student, his/her parents or legal quardian and school personnel, except when parents (or a student over 18) give written permission to allow access to other personnel or agencies, or when courts subpoena such records. Students with disabilities shall have the option of deciding whether to disclose the existence of their disability on their high school transcripts. FERPA also permits school officials to disclose any and all education records, including disciplinary records, to another institution at which the student seeks or intends to enroll. This also applies to post-secondary institutions (colleges), upon request.





Requirements for Admission

All students entering the Auburn School District must bring proof of immunizations. Please refer to the Health Services Department on the district website for specific requirements: https://www.aecsd.education

For Parents Who Have Students with a Health Concern: Make your child's health concern known to the school and school nurse. Introduce yourself and your child to the school nurse. Bring current signed healthcare provider orders. Together with the school nurse and other appropriate school officials, and family develop an individualized healthcare plan (or other educational plans, as needed, e.g., 504, IEP). Give permission for the school nurse to communicate with your family's healthcare provider. Provide parent/quardian contact information and update the school with any changes. Ask if non-nurses will be providing care (for example, verify who will administer medication) and how these authorized individuals will be supervised. Confirm the school's disaster/emergency plan. Make sure your child's medication and/or medical devices (epinephrine auto-injectors, asthma inhalers, insulin, etc.) will be readily available in an emergency. Let the school know how important it is to have a full-time registered school nurse in the building all day, every day.

Transportation

Elementary students, grades K-6, are transported if they live one mile from the school they attend. Junior high school students, grades 7-8, are transported if they live 1.5 miles from their school. High school students must live two miles from the school to be transported.

Distances are measured by the shortest route to or from the school. Measurements are taken from a point on the public road opposite the front door of the school to a point on the public road in front of the home. No private roads may be included in the computations. The district uses a routing program Transfinder. **Requests to have transportation distances re-measured must be made before October 1**. Please call First Student with questions at 252-3401.

SAT — The class of 2006 was the first class to take the new SAT for college admissions. The SAT Reasoning Test (formerly SAT I: Reasoning Test) better known as the SAT is a test that measures critical reading, writing, and mathematical reasoning skills students have developed over time and skills they need to be successful academically. The SAT consists of nine sections, including a 25 minute essay, each timed separately.

ACT — American College Test/Achievement Test This is used in the college admission process and tests academic abilities in English, Math, Social Studies, and Science.

PSAT — Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test This test is administered to juniors during October. It measures math and verbal skills and is designed to help prepare students for further college admissions. testing. Test to determine National Merit Scholars.

Attendance Policy

Education Law in the State of New York requires all children between the ages of 6 and 16 to be in attendance whenever school is in session.

The Auburn Enlarged City School District's philosophy of attendance is based on the principle that students who are in school every day perform at a higher academic level. The goal of the Auburn Enlarged City School District's attendance policy is to enable parents/guardians, school staff, and community to work together to encourage daily attendance and punctuality to maximize student achievement, potential, and safety.

All students are expected to strive for 100% daily attendance.

The Objectives of the Attendance Policy are as follows:

- To verify that individual students are complying with compulsory education laws concerning school attendance.
- 2. To track students' whereabouts during school hours for safety and school management reasons.
- 3. To identify and address attendance patterns.
- 4. To use attendance data to aid in developing interventions to help close the gap in student performance.
- 5. To accurately determine the district's average daily attendance for State Aid purposes.

Strategies to Meet Objectives

The School District will:

- a) Track and maintain the attendance, absence, tardiness and early departure of every student.
- Develop early intervention strategies to improve school attendance.
- Develop incentives for daily attendance at the building level.
- d) Inform and educate district staff and families about the Attendance Policy through the faculty orientation, student handbook, the district website, the newsletter, appropriate meeting venues, and plan periodic updates as needed.
- Review the district's attendance records and attendance policy on an annual basis, prior to the start of the new school year, and report recommedations to the School Board.
- 6. Carry out Disciplinary Interventions prior to attendance falling below an acceptable level.

Intervention Strategy Process

Schools within the district will create incentives to encourage high attendance, and develop a positive school building culture with strong adult role models, and value placed on respectful and nurturing interactions between adults and students. Each school will foster a climate that will encourage increased attendance.

- a) When there is an identified pattern of unexcused absences, tardiness, or early departures, the following actions will occur:
- A meeting of the principal, counselor, teacher, parent/guardian, and others as deemed necessary, will occur.
- c) The principal, or his/her designee, is responsible for administering appropriate sanctions for excessive absences, tardiness, or early dismissals.
- d) Any parent/guardian wishing to appeal denial of course credit should contact the building principal.

Harassment

The Board of Education affirms its commitment to non-discrimination and recognizes its responsibility to provide for all District employees an environment that is free of sexual harassment and intimidation. Sexual harassment is a violation of law and stands in direct opposition to District policy. Therefore, the Board prohibits and condemns all forms of sexual harassment by employees, school volunteers, students and non-employees such as contractors and vendors which occur on school grounds and at all school-sponsored events, programs and activities including those that take place at locations off school premises. Generally, sexual harassment is defined as unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature.

Upon receipt of an informal/formal complaint, the District will conduct a thorough investigation of the charges. However, even in the absence of a complaint, if the District has knowledge of or has reason to know of or suspect any occurrence of sexual harassment, the District will investigate such conduct promptly and thoroughly.

A copy of this policy and its accompanying regulation will be available upon request and may be posted at various locations in each school building.

School Food Service

The school meal program, operating on a self-sustaining basis, provides full hot and cold lunches and breakfasts in all schools. A monthly menu lists the daily offerings. All students in our elementary schools are able to receive **breakfast and lunch at no cost**. This program, called the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP), allows all elementary students to obtain complete meals, free of charge, regardless of household income. This program was established by the Food and Nutrition Service of the United States Department of Agriculture to make it easier for children in low income communities to receive meals at no charge. At the present time, this program is available to students in the elementary schools only.

There are no applications to complete. As long as the student takes a complete ('reimbursable') meal, it will be free. If the student wishes to purchase a second meal, or only parts of a meal, (i.e., milk), there will be a charge for that, so you may still wish to keep or establish a prepaid meal account for your child.

Eligibility for free and reduced price meals is determined following federal guidelines. Applications are available at your child's school throughout the school year, on the district's website or from the district business office.

Free and Reduced Meals

The school district will provide Free and Reduced Meals to Jr. High and High School children whose families meet federal eligibility criteria. Families with incomes at or below the amount determined by their family size may be eligible for, and are urged to apply for, free and/or reduced priced meals.

Application forms will be sent home on or about, the first day of school. Additional applications are available in the main office of each school. All information is considered confidential. If a family member becomes unemployed, if the family size decreases, or if the family size increases, the family must contact the school to file a new application.

The following chart lists income levels according to household size and income levels received either yearly, monthly or weekly. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals.

Student Services

In order to enhance the academic achievement and attendance of students, the district employs specialists to provide educationally related support services.

SCHOOL COUNSELING

This program has many objectives. One important outcome for each counselor is that each student develops a positive attitude toward peers and school. Each Junior High and High School student is assigned to a counselor who affects student behavior both directly and indirectly. The counselor is directly involved in the development of students through individual and group counseling, classroom guidance projects, and curricular work. The counselor may also indirectly bring about change in students by consulting with teachers, parents and administrators. The counselor helps the student adjust to the school and assists in planning the student's school program and future goals.

Parents are encouraged to contact their child's counselor to discuss their child's development in all areas.

PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES

Psychological services are available in each building. The psychologist provides an educationally related support service through diagnostic testing to assess the social, emotional, intellectual and perceptual-motor development of children experiencing learning problems. This evaluation is used to prepare a written prescription for individualized remedial and special programs. The psychologist provides consultations to teachers and parents on behavioral and instructional management problems. The psychologist always contacts the parents when directly involved with a child's educational program.

SOCIAL WORKER SERVICE

School Social Workers are assigned to the elementary level and to the secondary level. The social workers provide a direct and indirect service to children and their families. This relationship often is the basis for families having trust in the school, and enabling them to better cooperate with educational planning for their child. The social workers do follow-up work on all serious attendance problems and coordinate the effort with the building staff.

The social workers provide a portion of the counseling as a related and support service to disabled and non-disabled pupils. They are also an important liaison between the school, the family, and community agencies. The social workers are the primary contact in any suspected child abuse case.

Auburn School District Income Tax Code

All taxpavers who are included in the Auburn Enlarged City School District should use the code number 025 in the space requesting this information on the NYS Personal Income Tax Form. Income reported on the tax form serves as a measure of the wealth of the school district. School aid will be affected if the school district or code number is incorrect or is missing.

Students with Disabilities

The Auburn Enlarged City School District needs your help in locating and identifying students that reside in the district and who may have a disability that interferes with their ability to make expected progress in school. If you suspect your child(ren), ages 3-21, has a disability that may impact his/her progress in school, and he/she does **NOT** currently receive special education services, please contact the office below:

The Special Education Office will contact you by letter or phone to assist you with the next steps in the process of determining if your child(ren) is eligible for classification with an educational disability and the necessary services to support him/her to make expected progress in school.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES & SCHOOL HEALTH PHYSICALS

Health services are provided for all pupils consistent with state and federal law.

New York State Law Education Section 903 requires physical examinations for students in grades preK, K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11 and non-grade level programs, sports participation, for all new entrants, and students requiring a triennial review, and at any grade level by school administration in their discretion to promote the educational interests of the student. It is highly recommended that your child see his or her own physician for this physical examination. Your family physician is the person best qualified to provide a thorough physical examination and history of your child for the school health record. The physical examination in conjunction with hearing and vision screening, are helpful in determining some health problems which may interfere with the learning process. A form, to be completed by the physician, may be obtained from the school health office. If this is not done, a physical appraisal will be performed by the school physician with the assistance of the school nurse. Any condition determined by the doctor to require further medical attention will be reported to the parent/guardian for follow-up by the family doctor.

Students with disabilities who receive special education services may also require a medical examination by their private physician. Notification will be made by the school health office.

If a child has a sport physical during the year in which a specified grade level physical is required, the sports physical will be sufficient for both requirements.

A school nurse is responsible for the health program in each school. Health records are maintained on each student, which include a medical history and information on height, weight, BMI, vision, hearing, blood pressure, color perception and scoliosis screening performed throughout the child's elementary, middle and high school experience. Parents are notified if a child fails to pass any screening test and recommendations are made for further medical evaluations. Special health problems are followed as needed.

If you have any questions regarding the health program for your child, please contact the nurse in your child's school. It is important to keep the school nurse informed of any changes in your child's health status, to assist her in providing the safest and best health care and services available to your child.

SPORTS PHYSICALS

Every student that intends to participate in any School District sport is required to have a yearly sports physical examination prior to the start of that sport's tryouts. It is highly recommended that your child see his or her own physician for the necessary sports physical. Your family physician knows your child on a more personal basis and he or she is the person best qualified to provide a thorough sport physical examination and medical history of your child. Your family physician must complete the Physical Report portion of the Pre-participation Health History & Medical Consent form (75 D), qualifying your child for the appropriate sports. Although this is at your own expense, most health insurance companies will cover the cost of one well-child physical per year. If you do not obtain your child's physical from your own physician, the District has scheduled school sponsored sports physicals, at no cost. These dates can be found in the school calendar or by contacting the Health or Athletic office.

Your student needs only one sports physical examination per year, but the parent/guardian must complete registration online at Family ID prior to the start of each subsequent new sport season.

If you need help with the Family ID application process, please call 888-800-5583.

The Auburn School District Chief Medical Physician must review and approve all sports physical exams and Pre-participation health exam records for students to participate in the sports program. If you have any questions contact your School Nurse.

Senior Citizen Passes

Senior citizens over 62 years of age are eligible for a "Golden Age Pass" from the Auburn School District. The pass allows persons into all athletic, drama and music events in the district free of charge. Senior citizens may pick up passes at the Harriet Tubman Administrative Offices at 78 Thornton Avenue.

SCHOOL MEDICATION POLICY

If you wish to have your child receive medication during school hours, the following policy, according to State Education Law, must be followed:

- No medication will be given in school without a doctor's written order. This order must include the student's name, name of medication, dosage, ime and dates to be given. The label on the medicine bottle is not sufficient.
- A written request from the parent for the school ealth office to administer the medication must be provided.
- Medicine arriving in school in unlabeled containers, baggies, etc. will not be given. The medication must be in its original container.
- 4. The medication should be delivered to the school by the parent/quardian.
- Do **not** send aspirin or other single dose medication to school with your child. These medications will not be administered without fulfillment of the requirements stated above.
- The medication will be kept in the school health office throughout the time it is to be administered.
- 7. Parents will be contacted to make arrangements to pick up discontinued or unused medication.
- Medications must be picked up at the end of the year or they will be discarded.
- 9. New physician orders for medication administration are required for each school year.
- 10. Students wishing to independently carry and use re spiratory rescue medications, Epi pens, insulin, glucagon or other related Diabetics management supplies require a primary providers attestation and medication order.

Under **no** circumstances, is a child to leave any medication in his/her locker, or classroom, or carry it with him/her without a doctor's order and notification to health staff.

School health office personnel **cannot** administer any internal medication without a physician's order and written permission from the parent. This includes: aspirin, aspergum, cough syrup, decongestants, stomach remedies and cough drops. If your physician recommends that your child receive an over-the-counter medication, he/she will be glad to provide an order for your child to bring to the school nurse along with the medication. **Parents are encouraged to assist their children to become self directed when receiving medications.**
