MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Community Members,

We are approaching the end of another school year, and though things are not exactly back to normal yet, at least they seem to be headed in that direction. I commend our school community for its perseverance and dedication to help ensure that our students get the education they deserve.

Our board of education and school district administrators worked countless hours developing the budget for the next school year with the continued goal of executing a budget that provides high-quality curriculum and instruction for our students, while keeping in mind the limited resources of the community. The Auburn Enlarged City School District continues to be one of the most fiscally efficient and resourceful districts in the state, spending \$16,640 per pupil versus the state average of \$23,471 per pupil.



The district's proposed budget expenditures for the 2022-2023 school year are \$90,286,532, which is up 7.7%, or \$6.4 million, from 2021-2022 due to additional instructional staff being hired, new alternative education programs at the high school and elementary schools, increased debt service costs for the capital project, as well as inflation. For the 2022-2023 school year, our district will receive \$3.5 million in additional foundation aid from New York State, which is an increase of 10.8%. The district will continue to spend down the fund balance; this year \$2,520,544 of the district's fund balance will be used to balance the budget.

The district will also continue to utilize the federal aid we received through the American Rescue Plan. This federal aid cannot be used for regular budget expenditures, and we have two more years to spend it all. The guidelines stated that some of the funds must be used to address "learning loss" caused by the pandemic, as well as building and technology infrastructure. So far, some of the major projects we have used the funds for are summer school programming for all grade levels, air purifiers for all rooms in every building, and the new alternative education programs.

The 2022-2023 proposed budget includes a net increase of 12 staff positions. With the addition of these positions, as well as the federal stimulus monies we are slated to receive, the district will be able to continue to provide additional social and emotional support to our students, continue our strong focus on improving our graduation rate, and much more.

While this proposed budget will include a 2.5 percent increase in the total tax levy, the tax rate will actually go down, from \$18.96 per \$1,000 of assessed value to an estimated \$17.31 per \$1,000 of assessed value. This represents a decrease in the school tax <u>rate</u> of nearly 9% and will be the lowest school tax rate in over a decade. The City of Auburn revised property assessments this year, with many properties increasing in value, significantly for some. While this isn't surprising, given increases in real estate costs in our area, rest assured your school taxes will not go up by the same rate as your assessment. The dynamics between the tax levy, tax rate, and equalization rates are complicated, especially in a year in which assessments are changing and, as of today, are not final. Based on today's estimates however, with this lower rate, an Auburn homeowner with a \$100,000 home whose assessment did not change will see their school taxes decrease by \$165. An Auburn homeowner whose assessment rose from \$100,000 to \$110,000, will see their taxes increase by a very small amount, going up just \$8 for the entire year.



2021-22 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- ✓ All Auburn community-based PreK sites have focused on social emotional learning through collaboration with the Syracuse University based Early Childhood Family and Community Engagement Center to ensure "Creating Effective PreK Teams". This has included ongoing professional development throughout the year for the staff.
- √ The Auburn literacy and math coaches have facilitated multiple professional development sessions after school to provide our teachers with the knowledge and tools to provide needed supports to our students to address the learning gaps that exist.
- √ Two Graduation Coaching positions were implemented at the secondary level this year in an effort to increase student achievement and high school graduation rates.
- ✓ The Auburn grade level and department teams have been utilizing a consistent data analysis process to reflect on data driven instructional practices. The goal is to utilize this knowledge to enhance student achievement and engagement. This will continue into the 2022-2023 school year.
- √ The Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Task Force has developed a draft for a district-wide Diversity, Equity & Inclusion plan.
- √ The Auburn IT department distributed and supported over 5,000 Chromebooks for students in all grade levels and buildings.
- √ The Auburn technology mentors in each building provided professional development throughout the summer and school year to help support teachers and staff with their instructional technology goals. New softwares such as WeVideo and Canva have been added to enhance student creativity.



2021-22 ATHLETIC HIGHLIGHTS

- Our Modified Boys lacrosse program supported the financial/medical support fundraiser to benefit Ukraine on Saturday, April 23rd at Auburn High School. The boys were out in full force helping gather and store donations to help support this much needed cause.
- Members of the JV and Varsity football program spent time at Emerson Park in October to help beautify Deauville Island. All athletic programs are invited back on May 7th to help beautify the park; a great way for teams to represent our school and give back.
- The Auburn Football program spent a day in April on the SUNY Cortland campus which exposed our student athletes to the expectations of college admissions, the programs offered, touring academic buildings, athletic facilities, and tasting campus cuisine!
- The Girls Varsity Soccer program helped raise funds to support suicide awareness in a game versus neighboring district Mynderse Academy raising funds for organizations that help raise awareness and provide multiple resources for people throughout the county.
- The JV girls lacrosse program recently supported Healing Cayuga in a resource organization and distribution event.
- The Auburn Maroon Wrestling and Softball programs continued their charitable efforts during the winter holiday season providing gifts and food for families to make the season a bit more enjoyable.

Program Component: 74.73% of Budget

The Program component provides funding for the instruction of and educational support services of district students, including regular, special, and occupational education, guidance and health services, and cocurricular and interscholastic activities.

Also included are the costs of transporting students to and from the five elementary, one junior high, and one high school.

The Capital component provides funding for the operation and maintenance of the district's buildings and grounds, as well as for the costs of natural gas and electricity, water, sewer, and telephone services. Also included is funding for debt service - principal and interest payments on capital projects, installment purchases, leases, and interfund transfers.

It is a colorful and easy-to-operate robot, making it the perfect tool for teaching sequencing, estimation, problemsolving, and just having fun. Dash is a more advanced robot and requires the use of an iPad. Casey Park borrowed a set of Dashes and iPads from BOCES, so student programmers could explore loops, events, conditions, and sequences and even give Dash voice commands.


2022-2023 PROPOSED BUDGET EXPENDITURES



Social Emotional Learning at Auburn Junior High School



Throughout the 2021-2022 School year Auburn Junior High has extended homeroom on select Mondays to provide Social Emotional Learning for our students. Many of these "Pride Mondays" include activities from the Brooks Gibbs' SQUABBLES curriculum. Topics covered in the curriculum are a variety of situations our students face when interacting with their peers. Students watch a video that includes strategies on how to handle verbal insults, exclusion, physical provocation, positive thinking, helping others, managing emotions, etc. The videos are followed with a class discussion. On April 7th, Brooks Gibbs came to our school to speak to our assembly. The students were extremely excited to meet the man in the videos and were able to listen to his excellent advice. It was a great day at Auburn Junior High!



Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA)

Students who are applying to colleges, please be aware that procedures for the confidentiality of student records within the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) have recently changed. FERPA permits school officials to disclose all education records, including disciplinary records, to another institution at which the student seeks or intends to enroll. This now also applies to post-secondary institutions (colleges), upon request.

NYS SCHOOL TAX RELIEF PROGRAM (STAR)

Basic STAR Exemption Impact

Basic STAR tax savings	\$555.00

For ALL Owner-occupied Residences:

All taxpayers are eligible for a Basic STAR exemption for owner-occupied, primary residences. For 2022-2023 the STAR program continues to provide qualifying households with a \$30,000 exemption on the full value of their property. For a home with a full value of \$100,000, qualifying residents will realize an estimated \$555 in Basic STAR tax savings.

For Senior Citizens:

The Enhanced STAR program for senior citizens provides eligible seniors an exemption from school property taxes for owner-occupied, primary residences. To be eligible for this exemption, a property owner must be 65 years of age or older on December 31, 2022, with income not exceeding \$92,000.

STAR provides qualifying households with up to a \$74,900 exemption on the full value of their property. Qualifying residents owning a home with a full value of \$100,000 will recognize an estimated \$1,181 in Enhanced STAR tax savings in 2022-2023.

ESTIMATED SCHOOL TAX IMPACT:

Projections for the tax rates on each of the four towns and city comprising the Auburn Enlarged City School District are dependent upon the assessed value of the District, NYS equalization rates for each municipality and the local tax levy amount. Property assessments are still subject to change and equalization rates are not completed by the State until summer.



ABSENTEE VOTING

Qualified school district voters who are unable to vote in person on Tuesday, May 17, 2022, may vote in the Annual School District Election and Budget Vote by absentee ballot. Those who are ill, hospitalized, physically disabled, away on business or vacation, or who are detained in jail, awaiting action by a grand jury, awaiting trial or confined for an offense other than a felony or concerned about exposure to Covid-19 may use an absentee ballot to vote. Registered sex offenders must use an absentee ballot to vote.

To receive an absentee ballot, individuals must first fill out an application for the ballot. If you are unable to personally vote at your polling location, applications are available in the district office and on our website and may be filed up to one day before the date of the vote. High Quality Curriculum and Instruction

The Auburn Enlarged City School District will develop a framework and implement high quality curriculum, instruction, and balanced assessment model for all students. All staff will implement evidence-based practices including high yield instructional strategies that increase higher order thinking, collaboration and creativity, and student engagement.

Leadership and Innovation

All members of the Auburn Enlarged City School District and community are valued and seen as contributors to the goals of the district. Allocation of resources will support job-embedded professional development dedicated to promoting creative problem solving and critical thinking. We will seek to leverage emergent ideas and insights to realize measurable achievement gains for educators and students.

Systems Thinking

The Auburn Enlarged City School District will continually create benchmarks for success that align targeted resources to evaluate and enrich the quality of our instructional programs. Each student will be provided equitable access to meet and exceed the standards for college and career readiness.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATIONS

The Auburn School District is fortunate to receive support from a variety of local sources, including businesses and community organizations.

- The District collaborates with Cayuga Community College, Cayuga-Onondaga BOCES, Early Childhood Center, Auburn YMCA, Headstart, Cayuga Seneca Community Action Agency, Montessori School of the Finger Lakes and the John E. Gavras Center to provide Prekindergarten programming for 3 and 4 year old children in Auburn. These programs prepare our students for a strong academic start when they enter kindergarten.
- Auburn Education Foundation (AEF) is a major supporter of innovative projects in the District. This past school year the AEF sponsored book vending machines in our elementary buildings so that all five elementary school buildings have the opportunity to promote literacy and positive behavior for our student in grades K-6.
- The School District partners with Cayuga Community College (CCC) and the Manufacturer's Association of Central New York (MACNY) to support the Pathways in Technology Early College High School (P-TECH) program. This six year program provides eligible high school students an opportunity to complete classes at CCC and earn an Associate's Degree in Mechanical or Electrical Technologies.



DRIVER'S EDUCATION CLASSES

Driver's Education will be taking place this summer for current juniors and sophomores. To participate, students need to have a permit or license. There are 36 spots. If more students apply than there are spaces for, enrollment in this program will be determined by:

- a) Current juniors, then current sophomores.
- b) Students will be chosen for admission into the program based on a lottery.

Classroom sessions will be given virtually by a certified driver's education instructor. The classes will be every weekday for 12 consecutive school days starting on Tuesday July 5th through Wednesday, July 20th. All classes are from 10:00am - 12:00pm via Google Classroom and Zoom. Final exam will be Thursday, July 21st. The 24 hours of in-vehicle instruction will need to be completed under the supervision of a parent/guardian holding a valid New York State Driver's License. Applications can be found in the Counseling Office or in Google Classroom. Application deadline is May 20, 2022.



NEWS FROM GENESEE: The Innovation Lab at Genesee Elementary is full of amazing problem solvers! 5th graders channeled their inner Da Vinci's when they were designing, building and testing out flying machines! 3rd and 6th graders have been working on a robotics unit learning how to drive and program a Dash robot. 

Genesee Students Support Ukraine


