

AUBURN ATHLETICS ... Fall 2021 Varsity Athletic Summary

Football: Despite a season hampered by COVID 19 protocol issues the 2021 Varsity Football team earned a spot in the section 3 playoffs for the 4th year in a row and the senior class leaves with a 16-

8 record. The team also maintained a three-year, undefeated home win streak which dates back to 2018. The fall season also produced two record setting performances; Elijah Benson rushed for 406 yards on 24 carries and 4 touchdowns in a victory against ESM and Mekhi Bailey recorded 26 tackles (12 for a loss) vs West Genesee. Post Season Honors Include: First Team All-CNY: Desean Strachan & Elijah Benson.

<u>Girls Tennis</u>: The team finished the season with a record of 14-2 and won the League Championship. First team Salt City Athletic Conference (SCAC) league awards went to Alex

Vitale, Ella Bouley, Erin Calkins, Taylor Chadderdon, Elizabeth Spin, Emerson Brown and Audrey Carr. SCAC Second team honors were earned by Abby Carr/Claire Diffin (doubles) and Emma Merkley/Cara Vasile (doubles). In team Sectionals the girls defeated ESM and Liverpool before falling to FM in the finals of the tournament. The team received the NYSPHSAA Scholar Athlete Team Award.



Boys Golf: The team finished the season 9-7 and qualified for sectionals, finishing in 3rd place. The team received the NYSPHSAA Scholar Athlete Team Award. Carter Mizro was named the SCAC Co-Player of the Year along with earning 1st Team

All-League Honors. Christian Hogan was acknowledged to 2nd Team honors along with Colin Tardif picking up Honorable Mention. Mizro and Hogan both carded entries for the State Qualifier at Colgate University in the spring.

Field Hockey: The team finished the season with a league record of 4-0 and an overall record of 11-4. The team qualified for sectionals and lost to FM 0-3. The team received the NYSPHSAA Scholar Athlete Team Award. Ellie Dann was named The Citizen Field Hockey Player of the

Year while picking up 1st team SCAC and Section III All-Star Awards. Goalie, Zarya White and Defender, Ahndria Wilson headlined The Citizen Field Hockey All-Star line-up for the Maroons. 1st Team SCAC honors were earned by Lizzie O'Hara, Lauren Lowe, Zarya White, Sarah Fritz and Erica Leeson. While Madilyn Babb, Ahndria Wilson and Finley Hogan were named to the SCAC 2nd Team.



Girls Swimming: The team finished the season with an overall record of 1-7. The girls placed 8th overall at the Class A Section III Tournament on October 5th. Maura Moochler placed 4th in the 50

free and 3rd in the 100 free at Sectionals.

Volleyball: The Volleyball team finished the season with a league record of 4-8 and an overall record of 8-11. The team earned a sectional bid falling to a tough Liverpool squad in the opening round. Gabrielle Lupo picked up SCAC League Honorable Mention for the Maroons.

Open Enrollment for Auburn Enlarged City School District's **2022-2023 Universal Pre-Kindergarten Program**

The Universal Pre-Kindergarten Program is an integral component of our district and includes a UPK program for our 4-year-old learners and a 3PK program for 3-year olds. Together, these programs offer comprehensive educational services to <u>Auburn School District residents</u> who will be 3 or 4 years of age on or before December 1, 2022 and are available at *no cost* for eligible children.

A list of our Universal Pre-Kindergarten program locations (sites) below contains information regarding which sites offer 3PK and/or UPK and which sites provide full-day and/or half-day programs. Parents/guardians who prefer to submit their student's registration in person may pick up a 2022-2023 registration packet at any of the UPK sites listed above and also at any Auburn Elementary School or our

Administrative Offices. Registration packets will be available for pick up in mid-January. Completed applications should be submitted to your child's current Pre-Kindergarten site or to the Harriet Tubman Administrative Offices at 78 Thornton Ave. REMINDER: We cannot accept any completed registration packets prior to February 1st.

On behalf of the Auburn Enlarged City School District (AECSD) School Social Work
Department and Booker T. Washington Community Center (BTW), we would like to thank all
volunteers and donating sources for supporting our annual Fill-A-Belly Over the Extended
School Break Food Program in addition to our holiday assistance for our families in need.

The **Fill-A-Belly (FAB) Program** originated twelve years ago at the Genesee Elementary School. For a second year, we were able to expand this program and offer food to all families within the AECSD. The expansion was in response to years of increased reports of hunger, homelessness, and those living well below the poverty level, due to many extenuating variables which were magnified by the Covid-19 pandemic. While we all struggled with the pandemic in different ways, we were grateful for the generous donations provided by private donors, local community businesses and organizations.

The FAB Program was able to offer supplemental food boxes to food insecure families for the extended break from school. Each family received three boxes of food including: dairy, produce and non-perishable items, in addition to a bag of fresh meat, eggs and bread. According to our records, 165 families registered for the 2021 event with nearly 1,000 individuals benefiting from the food giveaway. Additional unregistered families were also able to receive food at the end of the event.

Students who are applying to colleges, please be aware that procedures for the confidentiality of student records within the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) have recently changed. FERPA permits school officials to disclose all education records, including disciplinary records, to another institution at which the student seeks or intends to enroll. This now also applies to post-secondary institutions (colleges), upon request.

Anonymous Alerts (report it)



The school district is pleased to continue our partnership with Anonymous Alerts®, the anti-bullying and safety reporting app and system. Starting in the 2018-2019 school year, this safety communications tool is a way for our students to quickly communicate anonymously with school officials and engage in anonymous 2-way communications to share more information about incidents. Types of concerns that may be reported include, but are not limited to, bullying, harassment, drug-related issues, fighting, weapons, threats, and more. The goal of this reporting system is to help maintain a safe school climate while giving students ample opportunity to securely communicate with school administrators without fear of retribution by their peers. The system will be monitored during school days between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m.


CPR Class: Any CPR is better then NO CPR

Mrs. Newton's 8th grade Health classes learned the importance of "Hands Only CPR" in class in December. Students were taught the importance of activating the EMS (CALL 911) anytime they witness the sudden collapse of an adult, and then providing high-quality chest compressions by pushing hard and fast in the middle of the victim's chest for 100 beats per minute.

CPR can double or triple a person's chances of survival. Remember that ANY CPR is better than NO CPR!
