## Postcards to Space from Casey Park

**What is a cow's two favorite places to visit in space? The Milky Way and the Moooon of course!**

These were just some of the topics that Mrs. Blaisdell's Third Grade class got to read and learn about in our ELA unit called "Astronomy: The Solar System and Beyond".

Students learned that the outer planets are not solid but made of gas (mostly hydrogen and helium); the big dipper is found within the constellation Ursa Major; and the International Space Station was designed and built by scientists from 4 countries - Russia, Canada, Japan and the United States. We were also amazed that it is approximately the size of a football field!

As our class continued learning about our Solar System, we wondered what else has ever been to space? That is when we learned about the "Postcards to Space" program.

Founded by Blue Origin, the Club for the Future is a nonprofit with the mission to inspire future generations to pursue careers in STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and math) for the benefit of Earth. The "Postcards to Space" program aims to inspire the next generation of world changers by participating in sending postcards to space!

Students were given a blank postcard to create their own picture and message about how space has inspired them. The postcards were then sent back to board Blue Origin's New Shepard rocket and will make the incredible journey to space! Once the rocket returns to earth; the postcards will be recovered, stamped "flown to space" and sent back to each student as a space-flown-keepsake.

## ***Parental Notice Language for 2025 - 2026 School Year***

As part of a required school health examination, a student is weighed, and his/her height is measured. These numbers are used to figure out the student's body mass index or 'BMI'. The BMI helps the doctor or nurse know if the student's weight is in a healthy range or is too high or too low. Recent changes to the New York State Education Law require that BMI and weight status group be included as part of the student's school health examination. A sample of school districts will be selected to take part in a survey by the New York State Department of Health. If our school is selected to be part of the survey, we will be reporting to New York State Department of Health information about our students' weight status groups. Only summary information is sent. No names and no information about individual students are sent. However, you may choose to have your child's information excluded from this survey report.

The information sent to the New York State Department of Health will help health officials develop programs that make it easier for children to be healthier.

## PESTICIDE NOTIFICATION

Dear Parents, Guardians, and School Staff:

New York State Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

The Auburn Enlarged City School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- a school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application;
- anti-microbial products;
- nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- nonvolatile insecticidal baits in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- the application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- the application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25;
- the use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps, and hornets.

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.

Students who are applying to colleges, please be aware that procedures for the confidentiality of student records within the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) have recently changed. FERPA permits school officials to disclose all education records, including disciplinary records, to another institution at which the student seeks or intends to enroll. This now also applies to post-secondary institutions (colleges), upon request.

We are excited to announce that our school district has transitioned from Anonymous Alerts to **SpeakUp for Safety**, a new student safety reporting system provided by Gaggle. This platform offers students a simple and confidential way to report concerns about school safety and the well-being of their peers—such as bullying, threats of violence, or students in crisis.

Students can **email tips to [speakup@aecsd.education](mailto:speakup@aecsd.education) or text/call 315-370-3222** at any time. There's no app to download—just a simple way to speak up when something doesn't feel right.

Messages are monitored by trained safety professionals 24/7/365, and serious concerns are immediately shared with district staff for appropriate action.

We believe SpeakUp for Safety will strengthen our efforts to maintain a safe and supportive environment for all students.
