## Valedictorian AHS Class of 2018

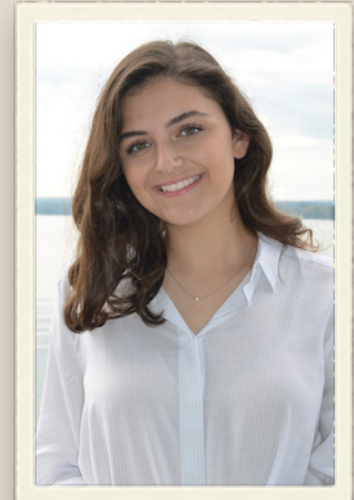

## Genesee's 4th Graders Experience Local History

In order to learn about Auburn's rich history and local government, Mrs. Gilmore and Ms. Jasinski's fourth graders took a walking field trip to downtown Auburn. Along the way they stopped at the Boyle Center to drop off bookmarks they created for the residents as part of Genesee's Kindness is Key Program ([www.kindness-is-key.org](http://www.kindness-is-key.org)). After the Boyle Center, the students traveled to the Seward House where they spent two hours touring the home and learning about the Seward family from guide Patti Nunno and Genesee's special friend Mr. O'Neill. The students' next stop was across the street to Memorial City Hall where the students had the honor of meeting New York State Parks Commissioner Rose Harvey. She was visiting Auburn to unveil the design for Auburn's first statue of Harriet Tubman which will be displayed at the entrance of the Equal Rights Cultural Heritage Center.

The students also had the opportunity to meet the great-great-grandniece of Harriet Tubman, Pauline Copes Johnson, and other Tubman descendants. After lunch, the students sat in the council's chambers to learn about local government and Auburn's history from City Clerk Chuck Mason. Finally, Mr. Mason took the students to the top floor where they were able to ring the Old Wheeler Bell named in honor of 19th century Auburn Mayor Cyrenus Wheeler Jr. As the students walked home, they stopped to admire the Harriet Tubman Memorial Mosaic.

## Three Auburn Students Earn New York State Seal of Biliteracy

Three Auburn High School (AHS) seniors earned a New York State Seal of Biliteracy at Onondaga-Cortland-Madison BOCES on May 22. A New York State Seal of Biliteracy is awarded to high school seniors who have attained a high level of proficiency in

listening, speaking, reading, and writing in one or more languages, in addition to English, by high school graduation. The three AHS students who earned this notable recognition are Corynn Barnes, Kaitlyn Diego, and Karleigh Harris.

To be eligible for the NYS Seal of Biliteracy and to demonstrate their proficiency, each student had to present a project before members of the New York State Seal of Biliteracy Committee at OCM BOCES in Liverpool, NY. Following the presentations, students were then graded on their performance and were required to earn a certain rubric score in order to receive the seal.

The seal acknowledges the importance of being bilingual in today's society and affirms the value of diversity in a multilingual society. The recognition of attaining biliteracy becomes part of the high school transcript and diploma for these students and is a statement of accomplishment for college admission and future employers.

Janna Fiermonte, ENL teacher at the high school, learned of the program through OCM BOCES and immediately explored offering the opportunity to Auburn seniors. "There was a lot of learning as we went along," Fiermonte said. "I am extremely thankful for Brian Morgan letting us pilot the program at AHS this year and for Jessica Killian and Krista Martin helping me with coordinating everything."

Students wishing to earn the New York State Seal of Biliteracy had to complete all of the requirements for graduation with a New York State Regents diploma, as well as earn three points each in English and World Language based on certain criteria in order to apply. Once an application was received, students were assigned to a mentor to help guide them through the process.

"Earning this means a lot to me, and to our mentors," Diego said. "My mentors, Ms. Fiermonte and Mrs. Killian, were so awesome!"

There were 13 mentors who agreed to work with students and took time out of their schedules to meet with and advise students, whether they completed the projects or not. The mentors helped students prioritize and ultimately make educated decisions about whether or not they wanted to continue.

"That kind of decision-making is part of real life," Fiermonte said. "I cannot thank all of the mentors and the AHS World Languages department enough for their continuous support throughout the process, whether it was helping to track down students, listen to projects and providing feedback, or volunteering to sit on the interview panels."

Barnes, Diego, and Harris are being awarded a medal and certificate from New York State in recognition of their accomplishment at the board of education meeting on June 12 at Auburn High School. They will receive the official Seal on their diplomas at graduation on June 22.

## Auburn's Innovators Lead and Learn!

On Saturday, May 19th, seven teams from the Auburn School District participated in BOCES' first Innovative Design Challenge Competition. Almost twenty teams participated in the BOCES-wide event which challenged students to come up with innovative ways to solve a problem within their school. Four Owasco elementary teams, coached by Librarian Victoria Calarco, proudly shared their prototypes for a hands-free Water Fountain Handle, Dynamic Locker Organizer, Collectible Pencil Toppers and Homework Alert Backpack. They were the only elementary teams represented at the event. Two 6th grade teams from Genesee Elementary School garnered first and second place trophies for their innovative ideas. The "Innovative Science Squad," coached by 6th grade teacher Shane Annal, took first place for their Hallway Noise Buster and the "Sparkly Design Duo," coached by Librarian Anne Mlod, took second place with their innovative design plan for improving their school cafeteria, which included using dry erase paint on the lunchroom tables and a handscanner to replace the entering of lunch codes. This team also took second place in the robotics maze challenge. The Auburn Jr. High Robotics team, "Nerds R Us," coached by technology teacher Matt Drastal, took first place in the robotics challenge. In addition to trophies, these students have developed innovation, design, collaboration and public speaking skills!

## Auburn High School Students Make Important Scientific Discovery!



Six groups of Auburn High School science students recently analyzed the health of Seneca Lake by participating in Hobart and William Smith Colleges Science on the Seneca program. The students boarded the Scandling Coast Guard vessel and were

accompanied by teachers Mrs. Austin, Mrs. Coye, Mrs. Lehman, and Mr. Untiedt. Students performed chemical, biological, and physical tests on Seneca Lake water and sediments. They used dredges, secchi disks, microscopes, lab equipment and monitors on the boat.



To the surprise of all, a new invasive species was discovered! It was documented and reported to Finger Lakes PRISM (Partnership for Regional Invasive Species Management), by Mrs. Nadia Harvieux of the Finger Lakes Institute.

Although it is not good news to find an invasive species, it is important that they are identified so scientists can find methods to control their growth. Hilary Mosher, the Finger Lakes PRISM Coordinator stated, "PRISM is thankful for the impressive field work done by the Auburn students to identify a tough invader. There is little information available about the distribution of starry stonewort (*Nitellopsis obtusa*) within the Finger Lakes and this first finding in Seneca Lake is very important as it will help researchers understand its potential impact on the region. Thank you for helping in the fight against invasive species!"

Through the generosity of Hobart and William Smith Colleges, students were treated to a complimentary lunch in the dining hall – definitely a highlight of the trip!

We owe a special thank you to Assistant Superintendent, Krista Martin, for finding grant money to fund our trip!

## Harmful Algal Bloom Season will soon be upon us!

The Cayuga County Health Department recommends:  
Avoiding blooms in lakes, ponds, and streams because harmful algal blooms can cause health effects in people and animals.



Know it.

It might be a harmful algal bloom if you see:

- Strongly colored water.
- Paint-like appearance.
- Floating mats or scums.



Avoid it.

Always stay away from blooms in lakes, ponds, and streams:

- Don't swim, fish, boat or wade in areas with blooms.
- Don't eat fish caught from areas with blooms.

If you're not on a public water supply:

- Bloom or no bloom, never drink, prepare food, cook, or make ice with untreated lake water.
- During a bloom, don't drink, prepare food, cook, or make ice with lake water, even if you treat it. Also consider not using the water for showering, bathing, or washing.

If you are on a public water supply:

- Your water is treated, disinfected and monitored for drinking and household use.

### Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA)

Students who are applying to colleges, please be aware that procedures for the confidentiality of student records within the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) have recently changed. FERPA permits school officials to disclose all education records, including disciplinary records, to another institution at which the student seeks or intends to enroll. This now also applies to post-secondary institutions (colleges), upon request.

## Student Health News

Dear Parents/Guardians,

As of July 1, 2018, New York State law requires a health examination for all students **entering the school district for the first time and when entering Pre-K or K, 1<sup>st</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, and 11<sup>th</sup> grade.**

The examination must be completed by a New York State licensed physician, physician assistant or nurse practitioner and on the approved NYSED Student Health Examination Form for School.

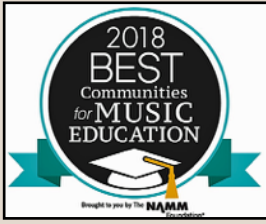
A dental certificate which states your child has been seen by a dentist or dental hygienist is also asked for at the same time. The school will provide you with a list of dentists and registered dental hygienists who offer dental services on a free or reduced cost basis if you ask for it.

- A copy of the health examination must be provided to the school within 30 days from when your child first starts at the school, and when your child starts K, 1<sup>st</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, & 11<sup>th</sup> grades. If a copy is not given to the school within 30 days, the school will contact you.
- If your child has an appointment for an exam during this school year that is after the first 30 days of school, please notify the Health Office with the date.
- Communication between private and school health staff is important for safe and effective care at school. Your healthcare provider may not share health information with school health staff without your signed permission. Please talk to your provider about signing their consent form for the school at the time of your child's appointment for the examination.

We suggest you make copies of the completed forms for your own records before sending them to the school health office.

Auburn has been designated as a “Best Community for Music Education 2018” by the NAMM Foundation. The BCME program recognizes the outstanding efforts by teachers, administrators, parents, students and community leaders who have made music education part of the curriculum. This is the 6th year in a row that the Auburn Music Department has received this national distinction.

In addition to the more than two dozen school concerts and performances this year, Auburn musicians participated in: Area All-State, CCMEA and OCMEA All-County Festivals, Auburn Chamber Orchestra, Syracuse Honor Band, Auburn Maroon Vanguard, Jazz Bands, NYSSMA Major Ensemble Festival, and NYSSMA Solo Festival, as well as numerous sporting and community events. ## Beef Steps up to the Plate in Middle School Family & Consumer Sciences (FACS) Class

"Beef, it's what's for dinner." That's what the New York State Beef Council wants students and families to say! Beef is big business in New York State, with some 1.4 million cattle dispersed among 39,000 farms, 99% of which are family owned. There are several ways to proclaim and celebrate the vastness of this industry - scientifically, with advances in husbandry; agriculturally, with protections to the environment; nutritionally, with an impressive array of vitamins and minerals in the meat; and culinary wise, with a myriad of ways to choose and prepare delicious beef dishes. It's not difficult to guess which aspect of beef was most engaging to 7<sup>th</sup> grade students!

When lessons on beef were first introduced, one student commented "what's there to know about beef? Just put it in the oven and cook it." Reframing the comments, I added "yes, you can set it and forget it, but which cuts will be naturally tender and which need marinating?"

After learning about the farming industry, differences in cattle, nutritional components of beef, and ways to select and prepare beef, students had a range of intelligent questions. Some focused on the welfare of the animals:

- "How long do cows milk for in their lifetimes?"
- "How do cows have their babies?"
- "How do butchers kill a cow?"

Other questions focused on the nutritional and culinary aspects of beef:

- "How does the cow's diet and grass quality affect the taste of the beef?"
- "Why do certain cuts of beef contain more nutrients than others?"
- "Which cut of beef is ranked above the rest for nutrition, taste and cost?"

In order to promote student performance objectives in FACS and involve parents and family members, students competed in a meatball judging contest after researching the cuisine of a specific culture. From Poland to Sweden to Puerto Rico and Brazil, each cooking group prepared a meatball recipe according to their culture and served it, garnish and all, to a panel of judges. Scoring comments were overwhelmingly positive: "appealing," "award winning," "spicy," "tasty," "innovative." An occasional "dry" and "bland" comment added to authentic feedback. Throughout the event, students were exposed to a variety of words in the kitchen, foods they'd never heard of, teamwork, decision-making and problem solving - just a few of the skills performed in this career and technical course.

#### Protecting Yourself in the Sun

### Block Out UV Rays - Great Guidance from OSHA

- **Cover up.** Wear tightly-woven clothing that blocks out light. Try this test: Place your hand between a single layer of the clothing and a light source. If you can see your hand through the fabric, the garment offers little protection.
- **Use sunscreen.** A sun protection factor (SPF) of at least 15 blocks 93 percent of UV rays. You want to block both UVA and UVB rays to guard against skin cancer. Be sure to follow application directions on the bottle.
- **Wear a hat.** A wide brim hat (not a baseball cap) is ideal because it protects the neck, ears, eyes, forehead, nose, and scalp.
- **Wear UV-absorbent shades.** Sunglasses don't have to be expensive, but they should block 99 to 100 percent of UVA and UVB radiation.
- **Limit exposure.** UV rays are most intense between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. If you're unsure about the sun's intensity, take the shadow test: If your shadow is shorter than you, the sun's rays are the day's strongest.

Knowing the basic facts about recreational water illnesses (RWIs) can make the difference between an enjoyable time at the pool, beach, or Water Park, and getting a rash, having diarrhea, or developing other, potentially serious illnesses. Share these tips with your school community!

#### Keep the pee, poop, sweat, & dirt out of the water!

- Stay out of the water if you have diarrhea.
- Shower before you get in the water.
- Don't pee or poop in the water.
- Don't swallow the water.

#### Every hour—everyone out!

- Take kids on bathroom breaks.
- Check diapers, and change them in a bathroom or diaper-changing area—not poolside—to keep germs away from the pool.
- Reapply sunscreen.
- Drink plenty of fluids.

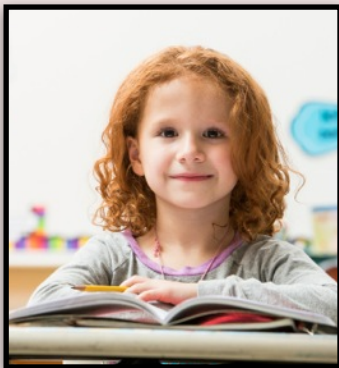

### PESTICIDE NOTIFICATION

Dear Parent, Guardian, and School Staff:

New York State Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

As a reminder, the Auburn Enlarged City School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- \* a school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application;
- \* Anti-microbial products;
- \* nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- \* nonvolatile insecticidal baits in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- \* silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- \* boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- \* the application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- \* the application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25;
- \* the use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps, and hornets.

If there is an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.

If you have not yet registered to receive 48-hour prior notification of pesticide applications that are scheduled to occur in your school, please complete the form below and return it to the Buildings & Grounds office Auburn Enlarged City School District pesticide representative, Larry Garuccio, at 78 Thornton Avenue, Auburn, NY 13021.

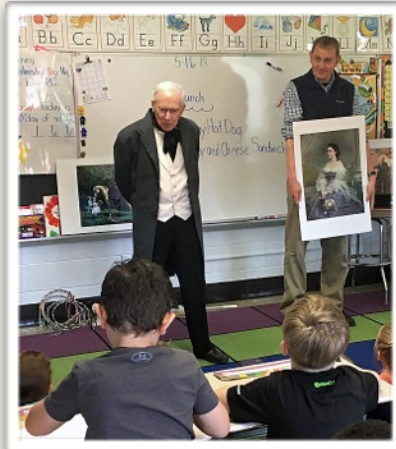
