Genesee Student Songs About Harriet Tubman Featured in Equal Rights Heritage Center

There are seldom field trips during the first full week of school, but that wasn't the case for Genesee 5th and 6th grade students. On September 13th, they were bused up the street to Auburn Public Theater, where they were professionally recorded singing the songs they created about Harriet Tubman in their 4th grade years with the folk duo Magpie (Terry Leonino and Greg Artzner). Cinda Gilmore, the 4th grade teacher instrumental in implementing the project, came out of retirement to assist with the recording, much to the delight of the students. The City of Auburn brought Leonino and Artzner back for the recording session, during which 6th grade

students recorded "Win the Vote: Harriet Tubman, Suffragist," and 5th grade students recorded "Bridge To Freedom" (about the connection between Harriet Tubman and Frederick Douglass), as well as "Oh Harriet, the Brave," the first song created By 4th grade students in 2014. This project, known as "Harriet Was Here," was originally sponsored by the organization "John Brown Lives!" Continued support for the project has come from Finger Lakes Community Art Grants, the Harriet Tubman Boosters, the Genesee Parent Teacher Partnership, Auburn Enlarged City School District and the Hilton Garden Inn.

The recordings will be a part of an exhibit in the new Equal Rights Heritage Center in downtown Auburn, which is slated to open at the end of October. According to Auburn City Clerk Chuck Mason, the exhibit will also include speeches and songs from the 1800's.

Seward PBIS Kick-Off!

On Monday, September 17 the Seward staff and student body came together in the gymnasium to kick-off the school year by reviewing the attributes of respect, responsibility, engagement and safety that are focused upon at the school through the Positive Behavioral Intervention & Supports (PBIS) system, which is utilized to assist in implementing a multitiered approach to social, emotional and behavior support. The school community also reviewed and taught new students and staff the Seward Stinger Rap.

The kick-off concluded with students returning to their rooms where the school continued review of the PBIS matrix by participating in a school wide survey on polleverywhere.com where each class responded to 10 prompts, and the principal, Mrs. Mahunik, revealed the correct responses and provided commentary through each of the questions posed. The school is off to a great start and is anxiously awaiting the opening of the new school store where they will be able to purchase items with their Bee Bucks that they earn for showing respect, responsibility, engagement and safety!



Attendance Awareness Month at Genesee Elementary

Implementing Positive Behavior Support in Preschools



PreK teachers are learning to incorporate a program-wide system of evidence-based practices to positively impact academic and behavioral instruction and intervention. This is known as PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports). Goals include creating an environment where EVERY child (and family) feels good about coming to school, developing good peer relationships and positive selfesteem, and highly engaging students, resulting in increased learning. Teachers will receive on-going professional development with Kelley Burt, Regional Preschool Behavior Specialist from OCM BOCES, throughout the 2018-2019 school year.





We are introducing a new tool called **Anonymous Alerts**, which is an online system that allows students to quickly, easily, and anonymously report strange behavior and information to school officials.

Thanks to a grant from the Auburn Kiwanis, Grimes will be visiting Genesee Elementary School the morning of the 1st to talk with 4th, 5th, and 6th grade students about her life as a writer. In the evening (time TBD), Grimes will be presenting a program at Auburn Public Theater, co-sponsored by the Harriet Tubman Boosters and Friends of Seymour Library. Anonymous Alerts

Possible incidents to report could include:

• Bullying / Cyberbullying • Family difficulties • Self-harm • Drug and alcohol abuse • Student depression • Sexual harassment • Fighting • Weapons • Threats

• Abnormal student behavior

The best way to address problems faced in school is by telling a teacher, principal, psychologist, or counselor. However, we do understand that sometimes a student may want to communicate something anonymously. The most important thing to remember is: See something, Do something! All reports submitted through Anonymous Alerts remain completely anonymous, but students do have the option to reveal their identity. The program is monitored from 8:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. on school days, but it is very important to understand that school officials will not be on the system every minute. Anonymous Alerts should only be used for serious matters, but if something seems disturbing or life threatening, call 911 immediately.



Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA)

Students who are applying to colleges, please be aware that procedures for the confidentiality of student records within the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) have recently changed. FERPA permits school officials to disclose all education records, including disciplinary records, to another institution at which the student seeks or intends to enroll. This now also applies to post-secondary institutions (colleges), upon request.

Enhanced STAR Exemption for Senior Citizens

Senior property owners who already have a Basic STAR Exemption on their primary residence may be eligible for the Enhanced STAR Exemption when they are 65. You should apply when you are 64 so that, if you qualify, you may receive the exemption beginning the year that you turn 65. Auburn city residents should contact the Assessor's Office at City Hall on South Street (255-4125). Other Auburn (Aurelius, Throop, Owasco, Sennett, Fleming) and Cayuga County residents should contact their local assessor's office. The deadline for applications for Auburn city residents is February 1. Other Auburn and Cayuga County residents should check with their local assessor.

The Enhanced STAR program for senior citizens provides eligible seniors an exemption from school property taxes for owner-occupied, primary residences. To be eligible for this exemption, a property owner must be 65 years of age or older on December 31, 2018, with income not exceeding \$86,000.

STAR provides qualifying households with up to a \$66,800 exemption on the full value of their property. Qualifying residents owning a home with a full value of \$100,000 will recognize an estimated \$1,181 in Enhanced STAR tax savings in 2018-2019.
