**1st Grade**—We've been reviewing our letters and numbers from Kindergarten and joining the Superkids for more reading excitement. In mathematics we've



2nd Grade— Second graders hit the ground running reviewing letter blends and



sounds. They are excited about all the growth they will achieve as independent readers this year. Mrs. Moulton has promised "the lightbulb will come on in March...it always does! Keep at it!" This week we were also introduced to nonfiction and are planning on putting the info we learn in these books to good use. In math we're working on making tens (ex. 7+3, 37+3, 64+6, etc.) We have a unit in measurement coming up soon so don't be surprised when we ask to borrow the tape measure, the bathroom scale, and the yard stick. We've got serious practicing to do:)

**3rd Grade**—3<sup>rd</sup> grade students have been welcomed into the "big kids hallway" and have

gotten right down to work. In ELA student are reading about how children all over the world go to school (environment, weather, culture, and opportunity). In math it's multiplication time; working on rows, arrays and redistribution of groups to determine alternate ways to calculate. It's really about visualizing as much as it is

#### 4th Grade—

- ELA: Students are starting the year off strong learning about the 6 Elements of a Story; Characters, Setting, Rising Action, Climax, Falling Action and Resolution. Thay will be identifying them in a variety of texts and then will ultimately be generating great stories of their own.
- Math: Working on place values from thousandths to millions.




• Science: Students are beginning a new Smithsonian unit of Energy Movement and Change.

5rd Grade— (Math) students established group norms and



expectations for working collaboratively. They're also exploring word problems and converting fractions to decimals. (Science) Freshwater is the topic of the day; water quality, biotic & abiotic factors, and transportation begin a multiweek study. (ELA) stu-



dents are learning about the rights and responsibilities of citizenship and will use that knowledge to drive the Constitution

#### 6th Grade—

- Students in MATH have reviewed key concepts from last year and are working their way through multiplying decimals as well as working independently and collaboratively.
- In ELA students are sharpening their writing through the Claim / Reasoning / Evidence!



- Coming up in Social Studies students will begin learning about the Women's Rights Movement and it's connections to local historical events.
- Leadership sixth graders have been helping out with morning announcements handling the Pledge of Allegiance, Owasco Pledge, Jokes of the Day and sharing thoughts on Kindness (our Word Of the Month). They also walk younger students to the bus every day, and several took turns painti and many are outstanding role models !
