Speech-Language Pathology avocation dates back to the 1800s when professionals became interested in helping individuals improve their speech.

Disability Highlight:

Speech or Language Impairment

Speech refers to an individual's articulation of sounds. Speech disorders occur when an individual is unable to produce particular speech sounds correctly or fluently. The most common articulation errors are the "s", "I" and "r". Language disorders are characterized by deficits in the areas of receptive and/or expressive language. Receptive language refers to how an individual understands language. Expressive language refers to how an individual utilizes words to express themselves.

Simple Tips to Promote Speech and Language Development

Set Up Routines and Use Repetitive Language

• Use the same words/phrases repeatedly during routine activities. Use gestures, actions and pointing when required simultaneously along with speech. Give your child sufficient time to respond

Modeling

• Modeling simple language for your child helps them to imitate. It also helps them use the words/ phrases independently in meaningful contexts.

Offer Choices


 When you question your child, give them choices. Limit asking yes/no questions like "Do you want the red car?" or open ended questions like, "What do you want?" Instead, you can ask the question this way "Do you want the red car or the blue one?"
